Effectiveness for God

The word effective indicates a measurement of success or failure. In order for someone to be determined as effective a result needs to be produced. For example, an apple tree is effective if it produces apples or a bee hive is effective if honey can be collected. How is effectiveness for God measured?

The Iowa Annual Conference is struggling to define effectiveness for God. What does it mean to be effective in ministry? What results can we produce? The quick answer is numerical with increased attendance in worship, Sunday school, bible studies, etc. Although the number of these fruits can be bountiful, the true question is which fruits are ready for harvest and which fruits have become rotten? I believe there is another result that can demonstrate our effectiveness for God.

The product I look for is in how we fulfill Jesus' new command, "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." I believe effectiveness for

God is when we, out of our love for God. reach out in love, care, and true concern for another human being. This means sharing what we know to be true by the way we speak, listen, and work. This is measured through our courage to share our faith story and to think of how our individual acts affect those around us. In other words, how have we personally grown closer to God? Are you ready to pray in public? Are you more comfortable talking about God? Are you more invested in the church and the ministry it is offering to everyone?

Effectiveness for God is more than numbers we count on Sunday morning; it also involves the transformation of hearts. I believe effectiveness for God is helping others know God's grace, love, forgiveness, and everything else God has to offer. I also believe that to be effective for God, I first have to know who God is and what God offers. As United Methodists, our





THE HISTORY OF THE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

A Prayer Shawl Ministry was started at the First United Methodist Church in Denison after a UMW member noticed a display of Prayer Shawls at a District meeting.

Since that time a group of knitters and crocheters has been meeting once a month in the Fireside Room. We open and close with prayer.

Opening Prayer

Dear Lord: Bless my hands as I knit/crochet today. May each twist of the yarn guide me to create a pattern of love and comfort in my work and remind me of your ultimate protection. Wrap me in your Spirit so that I will be more caring towards those in need. Grant me patience as I create this shawl and bless my handiwork as it travels to bring comfort, peace and joy. Closing Prayer

WHAT IS A PRAYER SHAWL?

A Prayer Shawl is a soft, warm shawl knitted or crocheted. It is given to persons who are ill, have suffered a loss or who are celebrating a joy or special occasion. There is no right or wrong way to create these gifts of love. They do not have to look alike nor be the same color. The patterns are simple and each shawl is one of a kind. The shawls are blessed by Pastor Alberta.

JOIN THE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

The ministry group meets at 10:00 a.m. on the third Thursday of the month. They knit and crochet. If you don't know how to do either, it's easily taught. Members also work at home.

To be involved in this ministry you can:

- 1. Knit or crochet a shawl
- 2. Share the name of a friend or a loved one who is in need of God's blessings
- 3. Help financially or donate yarn
- 4. Join us

Knitting Instructions

Use size 13 needles; Cast on 57 stitches; Patter: knit 3, purl 3 to end of row; turn and repeat pattern; finish with fringe or crocheted shell stitch

Crocheting Instructions

Use size N or P hook Chain 53, turn; sc for 3 rows; turn; in the second sc from the hook *do 3 dc, sk 1 st; sc in next st; sk 1 st; in next stitch repeat from * for width of shawl. Chain 2; turn (You should have 13 dc shells across) Note that the 3 dc shells are done in the center of the dc group in the row below. Repeat this row until shawl is desired length. End with 3 rows of sc. Finish with crocheted shell stitch.

In 1998, Janet Bristow and Victoria Galo, two graduates of the 1997 Women's Leadership Institute at The Hartford Seminary in Hartford, Connecticut gave birth to a ministry as a result of their experience in this program of applied Feminist Spirituality under the direction of Professor Miriam Therese Winter, MMS. Compassion and the love of knitting/crocheting have been combined into a prayerful ministry and spiritual practice which reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace, as well as in celebration and joy. Many blessings are prayed into every shawl.

Whether they are called Prayer Shawls, Comfort Shawls, Peace Shawls, or Mantles, etc., the shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, a final blessing is offered before the shawl is sent on its way. Some recipients have continued the kindness by making a shawl and passing it onto someone in need. Thus, the blessing ripples from person-to-person, with both the giver and receiver feeling the unconditional embrace of a sheltering, mothering God!

Bit of History

On Sunday, June 5, 1966, the consecration service for the newly constructed educational building was held.

According to the booklet prepared for this special
occasion Sunday school
classes were held as usual at
9:15 am followed by the hour
of worship at 10:30 am. The
setting of the "Date Stone"
was at 1:45 pm followed by
an open house from 2:00 pm
to 5:00 pm. Guided tours
were conducted, or you could
browse on your own. Coffee
and punch were served by
the ladies of the church.

The Service of Consecration was at 7:00 pm that evening with Dr. J. Henry Teele, Superintendent of the

Council Bluffs District, delivering the sermon. The opening hymn was "Make This New House Thine Own" and the closing hymn was "The Church's One Foundations is Jesus Christ Her Lord".

The service ended with this Litany of Consecration recited by the congregation: "We consecrate this building, grateful for the heritage of faith, conscious of the sacrifice of all who have shared in it's building, and aware of the tasks that lie before us in making Christ's way of life visible in deeds as in bricks and mortar. Grant us, O God, a continuing Spirit of joy and dedication to the honor and glory of Thy name. Amen.

May we continue that Spirit of joy as we worship together.
